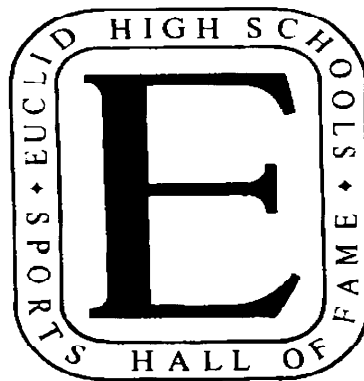

Brief History of Euclid High Schools

In 1868, the first high school was organized in Euclid Township. Classes were held in a School Street building. There were six students in the class, with the teacher also acting as principal and superintendent.

The first high school building was built on North Street in 1894. Forty-five were enrolled in the school. The first commencement was held on May 28, 1897, with six graduates receiving diplomas. (There were six graduates...and eleven men on the Board of Education.) That year there were 1,439 cases of tardiness reported and 87 cases of whipping, including five girls.

Central and Shore Schools were built in 1913. Of 36 who bid on the job, the lowest bidder received \$85,000 for the construction of both schools. Thus was born a healthy rivalry that continued to excite people all over town for many years. The rivalry was a challenge to each school. At the time, only a few rooms were occupied by high school classes. Although classes were mixed at Shore High, the boys had to use the Bliss Road (East 222nd Street) entrance, while the girls were obliged to enter from Babbitt Road.

A whole new era of high school environment started with the building of a single Euclid high school in 1949. Euclid Senior High School opened with an enrollment of 1,850 in grades 10 through 12. A new history of Euclid public high school experience was born. Peak enrollment in the top three grades was reached between 1965-75 when almost 3,000 students were enrolled.

In 2004, the high school underwent a transformation into six small schools with the help of a grant from the KnowledgeWorks Foundation. Each school has approximately 350 students, a principal, and a counselor. There is also a counselor who specializes in Career Technical and Post Secondary education serving all schools.

Euclid high schools have contributed to local, national and international offerings in music, art, sports and in the areas of science, business, politics and education, as well as in general entries into the work force of America.

WELCOME

We welcome you to the Twenty-Second Annual Banquet and Induction Ceremony of the Euclid High Schools Sports Hall of Fame. The schools represented are Euclid Central, Euclid Shore, Euclid Senior, and Euclid High Schools. Since 1908, these schools have fielded approximately 1,150 varsity teams with about 18,000 young men and women athletes competing.

The 2008 inductees have achieved many conference, league, sectional, district, and individual championships in many sports.

Individual player awards went to four who made All-Scholastic Teams, three who made the All-Lake Erie League Team, three who made the All-Greater Cleveland Conference Team, two who won the Most Valuable Player Award on their team, four who were selected to the *Plain Dealer* All-Star Team, one who was named to the *Cleveland Press* and *Call and Post* Teams, three who were named to the *News-Herald* All-Star Team, one who was picked for the *Sun-Journal* All Star Team, three who were chosen for a Most Outstanding Player Award, two who made the All-Northeast Ohio Team, three who for two years were singled out for the All-Ohio Team, and one who was selected as Mr. Ohio Football.

As collegians some achieved the following awards: one made the All-Ohio Athletic Conference All-Star Team, two made the All Mid-American Conference Team, one was picked for the All Southeast Conference Team, one won his team's Player of the Year Award, one was named his team's Most Valuable Player, and three were honored with selection to an All-American Team.

On the professional level, two played in the National Football League, and one played in the National Indoor Football League, winning the NIFL's Defensive Player of the Year and MVP Awards.

The coach inductee is the coach with the most football wins in Euclid's history, and the honorary inductee is a man who is also in Euclid's Distinguished Achievement Award Hall of Fame.

A number of this year's inductees are still competing in various sports at the amateur level. One has even had his name assigned by the *News-Herald* to a prestigious annual award for the most outstanding local

football player. We thank you for joining us in honoring these fine people who have given us so many exciting hours on the playing fields, courts, and floors, or in the pools in which they competed.

EUCLID SCHOOLS SPORTS HALL OF FAME
EUCLID WRESTLING STATE CHAMPIONSHIP TEAMS
1949, 1952, 1958

Tonight, the Euclid Schools Sports Hall of Fame is privileged to recognize three Euclid Schools State Championship wrestling teams, the only wrestling teams to have won this singular honor in the history of the Euclid School District. These teams won their championships during a 10-year span and were coached by the same man, Hall of Fame Coach Clarence Eckert. Coach Eckert's State Championship teams were the 1949 Euclid Shore and the 1952 and 1958 Euclid Senior High squads.

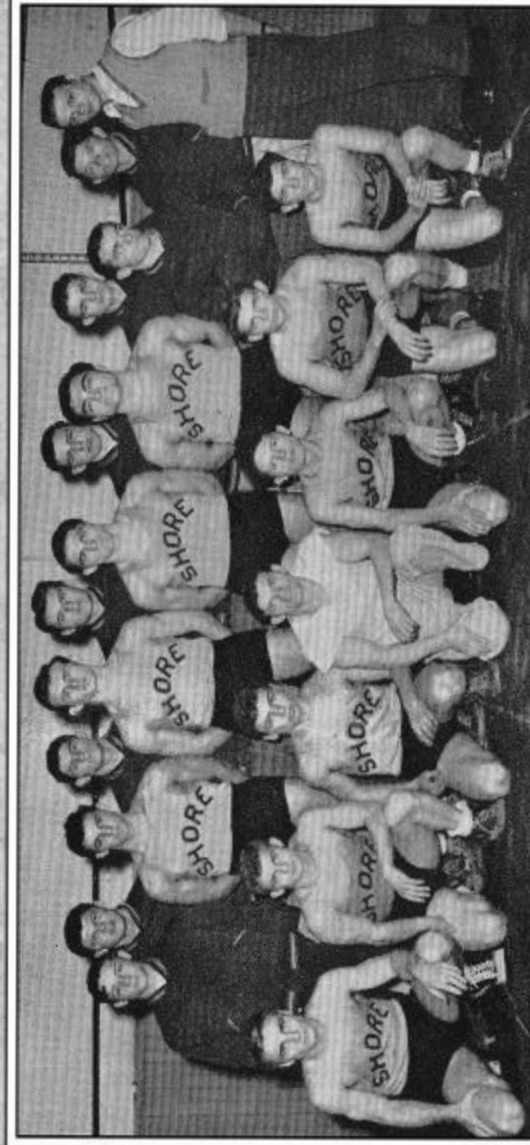
The **1949 Shore High School** team won its first State Championship in the final year of that school's existence as a high school, a "fitting climax to Shore High's last year of athletic competition," as the school's yearbook put it. On its way to an 11-0 undefeated season, Shore had also won the City Championship that year in a league which included teams from the City of Cleveland and many suburbs. There were three individual state champions on that team: Bill Erb, Dick Fox, and Bob Marich. Coming close was Phil Gutman who pinned one opponent and took a second place. All four of these wrestlers are in the Sports Hall of Fame.

The **1952 Euclid Senior High School** team won the first-ever State Championship in the new school's sports history, the High School building on East 222 Street having just been completed, named, and opened in the fall of 1949 to replace Euclid Shore and Euclid Central High Schools. This team tied for first place in the Greater Cleveland Wrestling Conference with Shaker Heights High School, a team that the Panthers defeated in the final meeting of the year to clinch the tie as both teams had a 6-1 league record. Euclid had a 9-1 over-all record that year. At the State Wrestling Tournament, which was held at Euclid, the Panther wrestlers had one State Champion, Manuel Paz, and three runners-up to take the State Crown. Manuel, Mike Papouras, a sophomore on that team, and Joe Mayer, an assistant coach, are all in the Sports Hall of Fame.

The **1958 Euclid Senior High School** team had a handbook that contained some simple wisdom that Coach Eckert tried with great success to impart to his wrestlers. These words sum up what his mat men tried to accomplish: “Wrestling is an ancient and fascinating sport. No other true sport has the same objective, that of subduing an opponent with nothing more than the native physical endowments of skill, speed, and strength.” Undefeated in eight matches and winners of the Lake Erie League, Euclid sent eight boys to the State Championship Tournament, with three winning their individual championships and one earning second place as the team won its third State Title in 10 years. Taking firsts were Ken Ross, Don Green, and Bob Paz, each of whom is in the Sports Hall of Fame. Bill Murphy took a second.

Although great wrestlers followed on other fine Euclid teams, no team ever had the success that these three teams had during a decade of unmatched wrestling team excellence.

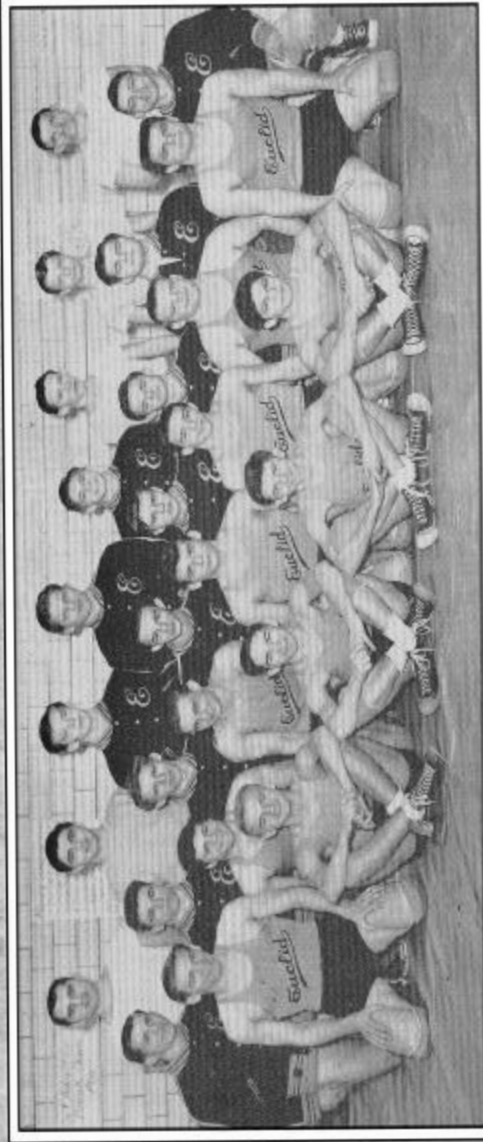

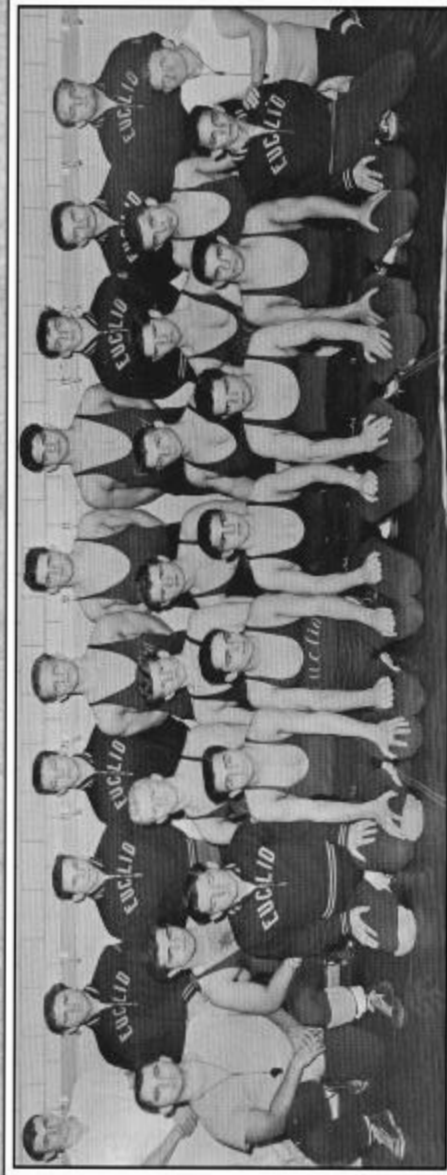

Euclid Senior High School State Wrestling Team Champions • 1958

**James “Jim” E. English, Jr....Euclid Senior High School
Class of 1972**



There are a lot of high school athletes who peak in high school. The same, however, cannot be said of Jim English who was an outstanding athlete in two sports in high school, basketball and track. His development did not stop when he finished high school. He continued to grow in those sports so much at the college level that he achieved a status that was more than outstanding. His star shined brightly wherever he played.

Jim was a 6-2 forward, two-year letter-winner in basketball for Hall of Fame Coach Doc Daugherty's teams. He was also a sprinter, jumper, and relay runner who won three letters for Bob Ramlow, another Hall of Fame Coach.

He played for Coach “Doc” from 1970 through 1972. For his senior year he was named co-captain of his team and won many honors, including making the *Plain Dealer* and *Call and Post* All-Scholastic Teams, the *Cleveland Press* Dream Team, the All-Lake Erie League Team, and the Northeast Ohio All-Sectional and All-District teams. He was twice listed as the Euclid Lettermen's Club Athlete of the Week and won the Euclid Fraternal Order of Police Outstanding Athlete and Athletic Achievement Awards along with the Richard Keay Senior Athlete of the Year Award. Doc calls Jim his best defensive player when he was a senior and still says that “he could play on my team any day. He was just an outstanding person and player.” Some of Jim's biggest memories include making it to the Regional Finals in his junior year and snagging an incredible 26 rebounds in a game against Valley Forge.

Jim's participation in track for Coach “Ram” had him participate in at least four events each meet, testing his stamina and ability to perform. But Jim did perform, setting a new school record in the high jump at 6'6 1/2” as well as helping to set records in the 440 and 880-yard and mile relays. His senior-year team, which he captained, was undefeated and was the champion of the Lake Erie League. At the Willoughby

South Class AAA Sectional Track Meet, Jim won the 220-yard dash and was named the “Most Outstanding Athlete” of the meet. He qualified for the State Meet in Columbus in each of his three senior high school years.

After graduating from high school, Jim went on to Baldwin-Wallace College where he was a four-year-letterman in basketball and a two-year-letterman in track. He was again named a team captain, this time of his college basketball team for the 1975 and 1976 seasons. As a senior he made the All-Conference Team for the third time, was named as his team’s Most Valuable Player, and was singled out for the “C.S.U. Press Brigade Team” that honored the “Five Best Players” from B-W, John Carroll University, and Cleveland State University. Not the least of his honors was his selection as a “Small College All-American.”

After leaving B-W, Jim became a Ranger Manager for the Cleveland Metroparks and then went on to become Manager of Guest Services for the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. He retired from service with the Metroparks after 33 years but was lured out of retirement to his present position as Manager of Events and Facilities for the Cuyahoga Valley National Park Association.

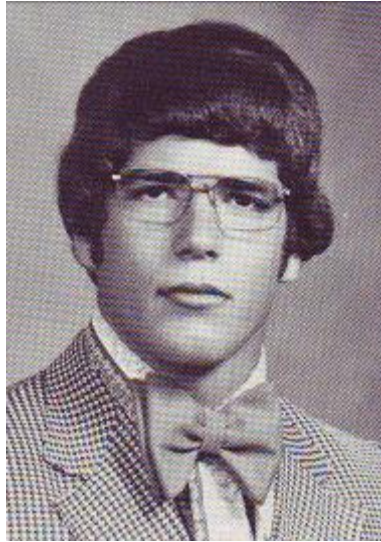
During his time after college Jim also served in the Berea Schools as a seventh grade and junior varsity head basketball coach and as an assistant coach for the varsity squad. He still “misses involvement with coaching” and is looking for a chance to get back into it.

Jim is very proud of his three sons. Ryan, his oldest, graduated from Ohio University and is Manager of Stadium Operations for the Inland Empire 66ers Baseball Club of San Bernardino, CA, the high Class A affiliate of the Los Angeles Dodgers. Kevin, who lives in Bath, Ohio, graduated from B-W and is a Production Manager with Ryan Homes. Sean, the youngest, is a senior at Ohio University, majoring in accounting. Kevin and Sean both participated in varsity sports at Berea High School and each received the Eloise Tressel Award for Most Outstanding Senior Athlete at that school.

Jim currently resides in Bath.

**Daniel “Dan” G. Fowler...Euclid Senior High School
Class of 1974**



Dan Fowler was a rugged young man who manned right tackle on offense and defense for the football teams of Head Coach Chet Rojeck, a Sport Hall of Famer. He also wrestled as a heavyweight for Head Coach Roger Brown and threw the discus and shot put for Hall of Fame Coach Bob Ramlow. All in all, the 6'5" 245-pounder earned eight varsity letters (three each in football and wrestling and two in track and field) and made his mark in each sport before he moved on to continued success in college and professional football.

In his senior year in high school, Dan was the Tri-Captain of his football team while also earning honors such as making the First Team of the *News-Herald* and the Honorable Mention Team of the Lake Erie League. Since he did not play for championship high school teams, his outstanding gridiron skills did not attract the publicity that they deserved. That all changed, however, when he got to college.

Dan also captained his wrestling team as a senior, was named Outstanding Senior Wrestler, earned First Team All-LEL honors, took second place in the Sectional Tournament and fifth place in the District Tournament, and went undefeated in the LEL Conference Meet on his way to a 17-2 over-all season record. His wrestling record as a sophomore and a junior was 11-1 each year. Over three years he accumulated a 39-4 won-loss record.

Dan had a stellar football career after high school at the University of Kentucky where with his own talents and the lobbying of Coach Rojeck and Assistant Coach Ron Seymour he had won a full football scholarship. (During the 1970's and 1980's, Euclid was able to place other star performers at Kentucky, including Rollie Skur, Stan Zupanic, Dave Yeckley, and Mike Spencer.) Once at Kentucky, Dan's ability was immediately recognized, and he became a four-year letterman and starter at tackle, guard, and center.

In his senior season for the Wildcats of the rugged Southeastern Conference, Dan was named as a guard on the SEC First Team and as a First Team All-American on the National Strength and Conditioning Team. Notably, he also was named as an Honorable Mention All-American by the *Sporting News*.

In 1979 he was drafted in the 10th Round by the New York Giants of the National Football League, a team that he played for as an offensive guard and tackle in the 1979 and 1980 seasons. When he eventually left football, he moved on to a business career.

Dan has written a poignant message to his former coach Ron Seymour that sums up his feelings about his Hall of Fame selection: "I am very grateful to the Euclid School System, and to all the teachers and coaches who helped mold me as a young man. Their encouragement, support, and discipline helped me become a better person, student, and athlete. Participating in athletics at Euclid High School taught me to win and lose as a team and to live life the right way. I am just so grateful for God's blessings and for all the Euclid High School coaches, players, students, and parents that befriended me." He notes that his notification of being inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame "brought back so many good memories from my past and gave me that feeling of youth and invincibility once again."

Dan currently is the Senior Vice President of Sales for AOL/Time Warner in Dulles, VA., and resides in Leesburg, VA.

**John Berlan....Euclid Senior High School
Class of 1980**



John Berlan was a big-time performer for Euclid Panther athletic teams. A strapping 6'4" 225-pounder, he starred as an offensive guard in football and as a shot putter and discus thrower on the track and field team. Success did not stop for him at the high school level. It continued to spiral onward and upward as he moved on to college.

John earned four letters in high school, two in football for Coach Ron Seymour and two in track and field for Hall of Fame Coach Bob Ramlow.

In football John almost was a forgotten young man. Like most football linemen, he toiled out of the limelight. This was especially true for those who, like John, played on teams that were not championship teams. Six years earlier, Dan Fowler, another promising Euclid lineman, was initially under-publicized for his football exploits. For John, Coach Seymour used his college contacts to get a college opportunity for John, as he had done earlier for Dan. This time the University of Toledo came calling for John as it started its rise to prominence as a football power in the Mid-American Conference. (Eventually five Euclid players, counting John, would wind up on UT teams.)

John had most of his publicity in high school on the track and field team. He still holds three records in the shot put relays for both the Euclid and Mentor Relays (164'5" and 162'11", respectively) and the individual shot put throw at the Mentor Relays (59'6 1/2"). He also had the longest discus throw at the Euclid Relays in 1980 (173'3 1/2").

When he got to Toledo on a full football scholarship, John's stock rose dramatically. As a sophomore in 1982 he was an Honorable Mention Selection for the All-MAC Team. In his junior and senior years he made the All-MAC First Team. He became a four-year letterman by the end of his fourth season. In that final season for him, the Rockets

won the MAC Championship and played in the California Bowl. Along the way he found time to letter as a junior on the track team.

After college John married Danielle Nichting, who graduated from Euclid High School after John in the Class of 1984. Together they have two young daughters, Marlene and Caroline.

Not one to forget a favor, John graciously has written a message to thank his former coach for nominating him to the Sports Hall of Fame and, probably more importantly, for not letting his athletic career end in high school. John writes:

“I first learned of my Hall of Fame notification nomination when I received a letter from Coach Seymour. My wife called me and asked if she should open the letter. I told her not to worry as it was probably an invitation to Coach Seymour’s retirement party. When I got home and opened the letter, I was humbled for even being considered for the Euclid High Schools Sports Hall of Fame.

“It brought back many wonderful memories of my great coaches: Ron Seymour, Jeff Hartmann, Art Bortnick, and Track Coach Bob Ramlow and also the fond memories of all my teammates who laid it on the line at each and every workout, practice, and game. The high level of competition at Euclid High School allowed me to move on and to play at the college level.

“Through the efforts of Coach Seymour, who went above and beyond the call of duty for any player who wanted to play football, I was granted a full scholarship to the University of Toledo.

“Coach Seymour, I want to thank you for taking time out of your busy schedule to nominate me for this honor. Obviously, without your gracious word to the college recruiters, I wouldn’t be filling out this (*inductee information*) form. I always thought the glory days were over, but it is always nice to remember those great times. I hope to see you or talk to you soon. Thanks again.”

**Wendy Potokar Crumbacher...Euclid High School
Class of 1983**



Jackie and Ron Potokar had two children who were exemplary student-athletes at Euclid High School. Dave, from the Class of 1987 was inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame in 2004. Now this year his sister Wendy has received her just due as she also becomes a member of this Hall of Fame for her many honors and achievements in volleyball and swimming, but especially in track.

In looking back at her life in sports, Wendy attributes one of her elementary-school physical education teachers as playing a major part in first giving her “the true taste of competition and working to be the best she could be, both on and off the playing field.” Chet Nolan at Lincoln Elementary School had that distinction, and Wendy has never forgotten his early morning gymnastics lessons and the track meets for 4th, 5th and 6th graders.

At Shore Junior High School Coach Lou Tomasi nurtured her development so much that she “fell in love with the hurdles” in 7th grade, a track event at which she would become a star in high school. Volleyball also became a passion for her, especially the reliance on the team concept inherent in that sport.

It was at Euclid High School that Wendy really blossomed as a sports star, with volleyball and track consuming most of her time. Swimming also attracted her, however, and she excelled in the aquatic sprints.

Awards started to pile up for her. As a sophomore she performed at such a high level in volleyball that she was given the Most Valuable Player Award while also becoming the top hurdler on the track team. As a junior she was selected as the Most Improved Player in volleyball, chose to go out for the swim team, and became a star on the track team. That year she earned a trophy for Most Team Points Scored (204), was Named the most valuable Player, and set the school record for the 100-

meter hurdles (14.6 seconds), the latter honor a haunting memory for her because she “wasn’t the conference champion. Second place was bitter sweet.”

Focusing on track as a senior, Wendy ran on the Indoor Track Team in the winter for Coaches Pete Schwenke and Bob Ramlow and did so well in the 300-meter hurdles event that Coach Schwenke, the girls track coach, had high hopes for her. In the spring for the outdoor season, she became a Greater Cleveland Conference Champion in the 100-meter hurdles, helped her team defeat Bedford for the Conference Title, and personally made it to the State Regionals. Despite her effort, however, a hamstring injury early in the outdoor season lingered on and made it impossible for her to go beyond the Regionals.

Wendy earned seven varsity letters: two in volleyball, one in swimming, one in indoor track, and three in outdoor track. As a senior she received the Fraternal Order of Police Outstanding Female Athlete Award. An outstanding student as well, she was a member of the National Honor Society, Senior Class Cabinet, Varsity Chorale, and the *Euclidian* Yearbook Staff.

Wendy attended Miami University where she had won a scholarship. She ran track for one year before injuring her knee and in 1987 earned her bachelor’s degree in K-12 physical education and health with a minor in photography. (She got her master’s degree in curriculum and instruction in 1992 at Ashland University.) She returned to the Euclid Schools to teach and coach for nine years. In 1993 she coached the varsity volleyball team to a 19-2 record, a Conference Championship, and District Runner-up Honors. “It was a great experience,” Wendy graciously notes, “to go from a coach/athlete relationship to a colleague relationship with Pat Buck (a Sports Hall of Fame Coach) as she became my freshman volleyball coach and taught me so much from this point of view.”

Still fiercely competitive, Wendy kept playing in sand and indoor volleyball tournaments, ranging from co-ed doubles to full-court women’s matches, at the Open and A levels from 1988 until 2000. In 1998 Wendy moved to the Bay Village, Ohio, Schools, where she has taught and coached volleyball and track teams and has been successful in training sprinters and hurdlers to move on to state competitions. Now she coaches middle-school track athletes, allowing her more time to spend with her husband and four-year-old daughter Rachel. Her

minor in photography has given her the background to start a second career taking photographs of weddings, family groups, babies, and senior graduations.

She currently lives in Avon, Ohio, with her daughter and her husband Chris. Still grateful for her Euclid experiences, she writes, "I could not have asked for a better place to grow up than Euclid and couldn't have asked for a more supportive fan base than my parents." When she was still a performer in high school, her loving and very proud father would occasionally tease her with a comment that was intended to prod her on to more excellence. "Not bad, for a girl," he would say, tongue in cheek. This night the public can see Wendy in all her earned glory. Her goals are still high and her quest for excellence has not diminished. If she wanted to, she could probably say to her father, "Not bad, for a girl, right, Dad?" And he would undoubtedly say right back, "Not bad, Wendy, for anyone."

Raashaun Jernigan...Euclid High School Class of 1993



What all-star running back in Euclid's storied football history excelled at the highest level in his junior year and then agreed in his senior year, a statement year for most high school athletes, to move to a completely different position so that another talented young man could take his place as the featured running back? It would be an understatement to say that not many players would ever agree to do that.

That, however, is exactly what Raashaun Jernigan did in the fall of 1992 when he agreed, willingly but also understandably somewhat reluctantly, to play wide receiver in his senior season so that Pepe Pearson (a 2005 Sports Hall of Famer) could take his place at running back. Team came first for Raashaun as he made probably the hardest decision of his young high school career.

All Raashaun did at this new position that season was to set a new team record for receptions, a record that still stands. He once again made the First Team on four local or district All-Star Teams and repeated as an All-Ohio Selection, this time as a receiver after being named as a running back as a junior.

As a sophomore running back, Raashaun's star first began to rise. He rushed for 678 yards and scored nine touchdowns.

He came into his own as a junior when he became one more outstanding tailback in Euclid's history of great ones in the 1980's and 1990-'s. He rushed for 1,005 yards and scored 25 TD's. He was the Offensive Player of the Year by the Greater Cleveland Conference, the *Plain Dealer*, and the *News-Herald*. He was named to the All-Northeast Ohio District First Team and to the All-Ohio Second Team.

At 5'9" and 170 pounds, Raashaun's accomplishment as a senior in a new position were all the more astounding because he duplicated his post-season All-Star selections, this time as a rookie receiver. He had 44 receptions for 606 yards and 17 TD's, an amazing total since that

1992 team ran the ball on offense so well. Once again he was a first-team selection on the GCC, *Plain Dealer, News-Herald*, and All-Northeast Ohio All-Star Teams, and again was a Second Team All-Ohio Selection, this time as a receiver.

For his career with the Panthers, Rawshaun scored 51 TD's, 43 as a running back. He played on teams that accumulated 19 consecutive regular season wins over the 1991 and 1992 seasons and a team that had a sixth-place ranking statewide by the Associated Press in 1992.

Raeshaun's career as an athlete was not restricted to football. In basketball he captained the team as a senior, lettered for three years while playing guard, scored 222 career points, played on teams that had 55 wins and 14 losses over three seasons, and performed in 57 games, the fourth highest total by a player in school history when he graduated.

His accomplishments as a four-year letter-winner in outdoor track were outstanding, especially during his senior season. In that season he was personally responsible for 1,500 of his team's 2,080 team points and obviously led his team in scoring. He was the high hurdles champion at the GCC and District Meets, as well as the Intermediate Hurdles Champion at the District Meet. At the State Meet he won fourth place honors in the high hurdles.

A football scholarship to Kent State University followed, and Raeshaun continued to excel on the gridiron. After his freshman year, he made the All-Mid-American Conference Second Team and was runner-up as the MAC Freshman of the Year.

He left Kent after one year and spent time at Edinboro University before moving on to play semi-professional football for the Cleveland Lions, a team that he led in rushing for the three seasons during which he played.

Rawshaun now lives with his wife and daughter in Cleveland Heights, Ohio, and works as a shipping tow motor driver in Solon. To his credit, he has as goal for the fall of 2008 a return to college to complete his degree studies.

**DeJuan Goulde...Euclid High School
Class of 1996**



There probably has never been a defensive end on Euclid football teams who was more intimidating than DeJuan Goulde was. He was a three-year letterman of distinction for the teams of Hall of Fame Coach Tom Banc.

At 6'2" and 210 pounds, DeJuan had good size for his position, but he relied more on speed, quickness, moves, and toughness to make his way past many all-star linemen to make a tackle. He established himself as the premiere defensive end in Northeast Ohio and one of the best in all of Ohio.

In football he earned honors as Most Valuable Player and selection to the First Teams of the Greater Cleveland Conference, *Plain Dealer* All-Scholastic, All-Northeast Ohio, *Sun-Journal* and *News-Herald*. Additionally, the *News-Herald* named him as the Defensive Player of the Year. He also was named to the All-Ohio Second Team.

DeJuan also played for Hall of Fame Coach Doc Daugherty's basketball teams for two years and for four years for Hall of Fame Coach Bob Ramlow's track teams. Altogether, he earned nine varsity letters: four in track, three in football, and two in basketball.

The University of Toledo rewarded DeJuan with a football scholarship, and he returned the favor by starting at defensive end for part of his sophomore and all of his junior and senior seasons. As a sophomore, he made the All-Mid-American Conference Second Team and as a junior and a senior he was a First Team All-MAC Selection. He was also picked as the MAC Defensive Player of the Year in his senior year. By then he had bulked up to between 270-280 pounds, the better to terrorize MAC opponents as Toledo won the MAC West during his final three years. He was also honored with selection as a Third Team All-American.

In his senior year, Toledo had the Number 1 defense in the nation and beat perennially powerful teams like Bowling Green, Marshall, and Penn State on its way to a 10-1 record and a ranking of 25th in the

nation. In each of those three televised games, DeJuan was selected as the Player of the Game by ESPN. At the start of that senior season, DeJuan was selected by Toledo to be its player representative along with the head coach for the annual pre-season MAC meeting. Throughout his entire career in high school, college, and eventually professional football, he played at only one position, defensive end.

DeJuan graduated from Toledo in the Spring of 2001 and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He attended tryouts for National Football League and Arena Football League teams, eventually playing in the National Indoor Football League (NIFL) with the Ohio Valley Greyhounds (Wheeling, WV) for three years. The team won the league title each year. In his second season he was the team's MVP and set a one-season record of 20.5 sacks. He finished his NIFL career with the Fayetteville, NC Wildcats and was the runner-up in the voting as the MVP player in the league.

DeJuan is out of football now, but the competitive fire still burns inside him. Still young enough to play at the professional level, he has bittersweet memories of opportunities not given to him to prove his worth on a playing field. He feels that he has lost opportunities not because he was not good enough to play, but because teams would not give him a chance to prove himself as a player.

He still remembers when the competitive fire to play football first ignited in him. He was a freshman on Euclid's 1992 team and sat on the bench. He could not believe how "exciting" it was to be part of that team. The thrill of playing under those Friday night lights still fires his imagination. He remembers talking to and being "inspired by teammates like Brandon Biggam, Shawn Thompson, Pepe Pearson, and Raeshaun Jernigan," among others. He especially learned a lot from the 1994 team, in particular of the "importance of working as a team, practicing hard, not waiting for something magical to help the team win." For DeJuan preparing to win occurred by hard work at practice and having teammates on whom you could rely.

He works now in a field where he can help mentally challenged youngsters who need the help of caring people like him. He began this career at the Rosemary Center in Euclid for 1 1/2 years before taking a position in Pittsburgh with the Allegheny Valley Schools Complex where he now holds a management position at the Coraopolis, PA campus.

When DeJuan was playing with the NIFL Greyhounds, he had the good fortune to meet the young lady who would become his wife. In the spring of 2008 DeJuan married Brooke and lives with her on the South Side of Pittsburgh. He is “thrilled to be honored by the Sports Hall of Fame.” He has not forgotten those Friday night lights on East 222nd Street and is thankful to the school and coaches who gave him the chance to prove himself. For DeJuan, those Friday night lights have never stopped glittering.

**Antoine “Tony” Fisher...Euclid High School
Class of 1998**



The Euclid Panthers Football Teams have had some spectacular running backs through the years. Only two of them, however, have ever been honored as Ohio’s best football player via an award known as Mr. Ohio Football. The first was Sports Hall of Famer Robert Smith who won the award twice. The second was Tony Fisher who in his first year of eligibility is now also being inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame. Euclid holds the distinction of being the only school in Ohio to have two winners of the Mr. Ohio Football Award and is also the only Ohio school to have had

one player win the award twice.

An amazing all-around athlete, Tony won 12 varsity letters in high school: four each in football, basketball, and track. His success in each sport was outstanding, but in football he played at a higher level than everyone else. His career gridiron exploits were so many that in 2007 the *News-Herald* chose to honor him by naming its annual football player of the year award as the Tony Fisher Award.

A three-year starter and team captain his senior year for Hall of Fame Coach Tom Banc, Tony ran up great records, a number of which are still standing. For example, his 2,120 rushing yards and 40 touchdowns during his senior season broke Robert Smith’s single-season records. His 224 points that season are still standing as an area record. *News-Herald* Sports Editor Mark Podolski in an August 23, 2007, article quoted a *N-H* staff writer as saying of Tony’s 224 points that it might be “the 56-game hitting streak of area football. Pretty much unbreakable.”

As a football Panther, Tony had many honors, including Player of the Year for the *Plain Dealer*, *News-Herald*, *Sun Journal*, Northeast Ohio, and Ohio Gatorade Teams. He was an All-Ohio Selection his last two seasons and Mr. Ohio Football in his last season.

In his other two varsity sports, Tony as a senior captained the basketball team for Hall of Fame Coach Doc Daugherty, was the *News-Herald's* Player of the Year, and was selected as the team's Most Valuable Player. In track for Hall of Fame Coach Bob Ramlow and Coach Frank Soltesz, he captained the team in his junior and senior years, won All-League honors, and was the team's MVP. He qualified for the State Meet in the long jump and 300-meter hurdles.

Highly recruited, Tony was greatly sought by Notre Dame, and in the fall of 1998 he made his decision and went off to South Bend to play football for the Fighting Irish. A 6'1", 227-pound tailback, he had a fine college career, rushing for 1,849 yards, accumulating 2,247 total yards, and scoring 20 TD's. He graduated in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in economics and computer applications.

After college, he spent four years with the Green Bay Packers of the National Football League as a running back, followed by a year with the St. Louis Rams. An injured anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) has slowed Tony, but he still entertains the possibility of a return to the NFL if a call comes.

Coach Banc still holds Tony in high esteem, telling the *News-Herald* that "he is a very good kid and very good athlete. Just a solid kid. He has very good moral fiber."

Tony still lives in Euclid in the off-season and conditions himself at the Euclid Sports Plant workout facility and in local basketball leagues where he can surprise younger players with his still considerable court talents. Of his off-season basketball playing he told the *News-Herald* in a 2006 article that "I can still play...sometimes I don't realize I'm a couple years older than those guys. They can run, but they might not realize I'm a little wiser, a little stronger than they are, so I have to slow the game down and use an old-man game on them." Age will eventually catch up to Tony, but there can be no doubt that on a playing field or on a court, in his heart he knows he can still play.

Tony currently is involved in investing in financial areas and in real estate. He enjoys spending time with his family and indulging his passion for adding to his still growing collection of shoes, which now totals 300!

Thomas “Tom” Banc Coach



Tom Banc definitely belongs in Euclid’s record books. No Euclid High School football coach ever had such a successful coaching career, won so many games, coached so many stars, had so many league titles, or coached for so many years. In addition, his teams never had a losing season. He set very high the bar for coaching excellence. When people talk of the golden age of Euclid football, they invariably will cite the years of his coaching tenure, 1985-1999.

Tom had a successful career before he came to coach the Panthers. He was first the head basketball coach at Lake Catholic High School before he became the highly successful football coach there. His teams were perennial powerhouses that regularly made the playoffs and twice made it to the Regional Finals, in 1982 and 1983. His record at Lake Catholic for six seasons was 39-19-3 with one league title.

A native of Euclid, Tom is a high school graduate of Euclid’s arch-rival, St. Joseph High School (now known as Villa Angels-St. Joseph High School). In high school he captained his basketball team and lettered for two years, and in football he lettered for one year. He is a graduate of John Carroll University.

In 1985, Tom came to coach the Panthers and proceeded to ring up 128 wins against 33 losses over 15 seasons, averaging over eight wins a season. His worst season was his first when his team went 5-5. Two times his teams lost four games, and twice they lost three games. Three times his teams lost two games, and six times they lost only one game. Three times that single loss came in post-season playoffs. Four times his teams finished the regular season schedule undefeated. In 1994 his team was the Associated Press #1 Team in Ohio.

His teams won nine league titles (Greater Cleveland Conference) over 15 seasons and posted an 88-12 record (88% winning percentage) in the GCC and Lake Erie League.

Inevitably, Tom won many coaching honors. In 1991 he was the *Plain Dealer* Coach of the Year, in 1994 he won the Associated Press Coach of the Year Award. Nine times he was the GCC Coach of the Year, and nine times his teams qualified for the Ohio post-season playoffs.

He is the only Ohio coach to have mentored two players who won three Mr. Ohio Football Awards, Robert Smith twice and Tony Fisher once.

In his 21 seasons as a head football coach, Tom's teams won 167 times, lost 52 times and tied three times. His total winning percentage is over 75%. At Euclid, over 15 seasons his teams won 128 times and lost 33 times for a 79.5% winning average. Tom has been a winning coach during his entire football head coaching career.

Tom is still greatly involved with Euclid Sports as he functions as the Euclid Schools Athletic Director, a position that he has held since he stepped down from coaching in 1999.

Together with his wife Fran, he lives in Mentor, OH. He has two married sons: Tom, who lives in Carbondale, CO, and Tim, who lives in Aurora, OH.

Kent K. Smith
Honorary



Kent Smith is a blue blood. This is, he figuratively bleeds Euclid blue since his pedigree is exclusively Euclid Schools. Both his parents taught in the Euclid School district, Kent graduated from the then-new Euclid High School, he (and his wife Judy) taught at Euclid Shore Junior High School, their three sons Kent, Mark, and Jeff all graduated from Euclid High school. In addition, at least one member of the Smith family, from Kent's parents, to Kent himself, and his son Kent, has owned a home in Euclid since 1943.

Kent has been inducted into the Sports Hall of Fame because of his great skill and accuracy in serving as the official scorer for Euclid's basketball since 1966, first at Shore Junior High School for 14 seasons and then at Central Junior High for the next six seasons. He got his start at the High school when Hall of Fame Coach Doc Daugherty had Kent act as the official scorer for varsity basketball in 1978. Since that time, Kent has scored nearly all of the boys' varsity and junior varsity games.

In 1949, the current Euclid High school building was first opened as a three-year senior high school. Kent has the distinction of playing in the first basketball game ever played in that building when as a sophomore he played guard for the Panthers' junior varsity team in the preliminary game to the varsity game. He played one more season on the varsity squad for Hall of Fame Coach Jim Calvert and made his way into Euclid's record books by scoring one basket during his career as a varsity player.

He graduated from Wittenberg University in 1956 and earned his master's degree from Western Reserve University in 1958. He then began his career as a science teacher at Shore Junior High School, teaching there until Shore closed in 1983. He moved to Central Middle School until he retired in 1986.

Kent continued his teaching career at Phillips Osborne School, a private school, for 13 more years until he retired from teaching for good in 2001 after 42 years as a science teacher.

In 1986 Kent received the Euclid Teachers Association Outstanding Educator Award. In 1987 he became the first educator selected to the Euclid Schools Distinguished Achievement Hall of Fame. With his induction into the Sports Hall of Fame in 2008, he becomes the 10th person to be inducted into both of Euclid's Halls of Fame.

Kent is thrilled that he has been the official scorer for nearly 60% of Euclid's boys' varsity and JV basketball games for the past 27 seasons. He has also scored for the Euclid Sectional and District Basketball Tournaments for 27 years. For about five years he has also served as the scorer for the girls' teams.

Kent has a healthy perspective on his scoring activities over the years. He writes, "The score book has been great and more than a little work. Imagine, the best seat in the gym...everyone stops to say hello, referees, coaches, sports writers...and I get paid for it."

2007 Hall of Fame

The 2007 inductees have achieved many conference, league, district, sectional, state team, and individual championships in all sports.
